In the name of God Amen I Gwen Williams of Bryn y felyn in the County of Merioneth being mindful of my mortality do this 13th day of May 1836 make and publish this my last will and testament in manner following...

I leave and bequeath the whole of my personal estate, whatever and wherever and of what nature kind and quality ----er the same may be to **my son Owen Owens**, his executors administrators and assigns, to and for his and their own use and benefit absolutely. And I do hereby constitute and appoint my said son sole Executor of this my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year first above written.

On the Tenth day of January in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and forty two, the within written Will was insinuated, proved, approved and in Common form of Law decreed Valid and Administration granted to the within named Executor Owen Owens; He being first sworn in Common form of Law and that the whole of the Goods Chattels and Credits of the deceased Testatrix do not amount in value to the Sum of One Hundred Pounds.
