

Prerogative Court of Canterbury and related Probate Jurisdictions: Will Registers,
PROB 11/1228/214.

Abstract of the Will of Thomas Ennis of the Parish of Redruth in the County of Cornwall, Gentleman, written 21 Apr 1791, proved 19 Feb 1793.

Gives to Thomas Nevill of the parish of Camborne, gentleman, Henry Woolcock of the parish of Redruth, gentleman, and John Penrose of Redruth, shopkeeper, his leasehold estate in Redruth Town called the Oxford Inn, in trust, for **his daughter Mary Vivian**, for her sole use and benefit during her life, and afterwards to her heirs. If she has no issue then he gives the same to **his daughter Sarah Ennis**.

Directs that the remainder of his freehold and leasehold estates shall remain with his trustees for the benefit of his heirs.

Gives £100 to **his grandson John Ennis Vivian**, to be paid to him when he turns twenty-one.

Gives annuities of £10 each to **his sisters Elizabeth Ennis**, spinster, and **Hannah Osborne**, widow, for the terms of their lives.

Gives to **his daughter Sarah Ennis** his freehold and leasehold estates in the parish of Redruth (excepting the Oxford Inn), along with all his shares in mines and ships, his cattle, household furniture, books, plate, china and cash in the house.

If the heirs of his daughters die without issue, then he gives the said freehold and leasehold estates to **his cousins John and Richard Penrose**.

Appoints the said Thomas Nevil, Henry Woolcock and John Penrose co-executors of his last will and testament.

In a codicil dated 29 Feb 1792 he gives to his daughter Mary Vivian two fields in the town of Redruth, and to his grandson John Ennis Vivian an additional £200.

Thomas Ennis was buried in Redruth on 19 Dec 1792.
