Item. His will is that his said son Giles when he reaches the age of twenty-one years shall enter into a bond or obligation to **his daughter Katherine Maskelyne** of £60, paying her £30 within two years after the death of his now wife Mary.

Item. His will is that his said son Giles when he reaches the age of twenty-one years shall also enter into a bond or obligation to **his son Edmond Maskelyne** of £60, paying him £30 within three years after the death of his now wife Mary.

Item. His will is that his said son Giles when he reaches the age of twenty-one years shall also enter into a bond or obligation to **his son John Maskelyne** of £60, paying him £30 within four years after the death of his now wife Mary.

Item. His will is that his said son Giles when he reaches the age of twenty-one years shall enter into one further bond or obligation to **his daughter Amy Maskelyne** of £40, paying her £20 within five years after the death of his now wife Mary.

Gives full power and authority to Edward Hopkins & John Brinsden both of Wootton Bassett, gents, to sell his said leasehold estate and to equally divide the money between his sons and daughters.

Item. Wills that his daughter Katherine shall be maintained out of his estate in Donington.

Item. All the rest of his goods and chattels he gives, bequeaths & devises to **his wife**Mary whom he makes sole executrix of his last will and testament.
